


Rosa Young

Rosa (Ferrill) Young was born November 21, 1864 near Doniphan, Ripley County, Missouri. She was married Sept. 6, 1883 to John W. Young, a young farmer. At the age of 14 while attending what was then known as a protracted meeting of the Campbellite (Christian) Church, she was converted and being a very conscienteous person she lived a very devoted Christian life. In the spring of 1893 two 18 year old boys, B.A. Stansbury and Ostis Wilson came to that part of the country preaching the doctrine of the True Church of God, both she and her husband gladly accepted the gospel known as the Last Reformation. In all the following years she has lived a prayer meeting in rain, mud, snow or sleet, but she must be there. While mever holding any responsible place as an officer or teacher, she has alway peen in her place for every service and in her Sunday School Class until age kept her from going. She visited many sick and discouraged and was a faithful worker in the Missionary Society. She has quilted many quilts and after she was in her 85th. year she pieced and quilted two quilts for the missionary group.

In 1906 she with her family moved from Missouri and located two miles north of Bristow, Indian Territory. Having come from a good sized congregation of saints, it was quite a test to come to the wilds of a new country where there were no established congregation. The first Sunday, with her brother W.D. Ferrill, and Mrs. Ferrill, they attended their first service. In the afternoon about 4 miles west of Bristow, which was held in the home of Bro. and Sr. T. E. Newell, with Bro. and Sr. D.A. Machlin, Bro. and Sr. Dunlap, and son Carl, Sister Butterfield, Sadie Hamons, Mr. and Mrs. W.D. Ferrill, Mrs. Young, Dollie and Tennie Young. On Christmas day of that year, a preaching service with a basket dinner was held in the home of E.H. Shipman, the blind preacher of Oklahoma, which was attended by all the Church of God people in the Bristow vicinity. Some present were the families of the Shipmans, Machlins, Ferrills, Youngs, Utzs, Newells, Dunlap, Rippitoe, Postons, and what a wonderful time we had. The next summer a Bro. and Sr. Ed Jones who lived down near Okemah, raised chickens and a garden and advertised in the Gospel Trumpet a Camp Meeting was to be held. Bro. Newells family and the Young family attended that meeting. Bro. Jones had built a large brush arbor in a lovely grove and while they only had a small two room house, all the cooking for every one was done in their home. There were about 50 persons attending that meeting. Bro. W.H. Smith and Bro. W.A.Moore were the evangelists and Sr. Jones had plenty of fryers to supply the camp and also vegetables from their garden. The Jones' later moved to Bristow and helped in the work. There was a little log school house 4 miles west of Bristow, near

the home of Bro. Machlin and Sunday School was started in this School House and finally Bro. Machlin and Bro. Newell succeeded in getting a preacher for a revival and that was the starting point of a Church of God being established in Bristow. The preacher that was obtained was Bro. C.S. Forbes of Chandler.

In the year of 1894, Mr. and Mrs. Abe Moore and their son Charles and his wife migrated from Ripley County, near Doniphan, Missouri and settled about four miles west of Bristow, Indian Territory on Indian land leased from the U.S. Government.

They missed the good meetings and the gatherings of their friends back home, and though the neighbors were scarce and quite a distance between houses, the Hoore's saw the need of a Sunday School and Church services, so they met together with one or two other families in the home of Charles Jackson. Bro. Chas. Moore was the teacher of the adults and his wife, Etta taught the children. Some months went by and they got in touch with Bro. G.W. Brake from Perkins and he came and helped them to organize their Sunday School and also started having Prayer Meetings in the homes. At one of those prayer meetings two others were saved, Bro. & Sr. D.A. Machlan. Soon the people of the community began asking for another minister to come and preach to them, so in June 1896, Bro. Grant Teeters of Pryor Creek came and held a meeting in an old log school house. Bro. W.H. Smith of Tulsa came and helped in this meeting which lasted several weeks.

A few years later Bro. W.H. Smith and Bro. Emory Shipman, both of Tulsa, would come and hold meetings either in the log school house or under a brush arbor. Some of the other ministers that would come and help them with this work was Bro. C.S. Forbes, Bro. Jim Murphy, Bro. Lightfoot and a number of others.

The work continued to grow and at last some one of those good ministers would come and preach to us - sometimes staying five or six weeks at a time and always preaching from two to four hours. People would drive as many as ten miles to hear them after plowing in the field all day.

It was in one of these services - in 1907- that Bro. Fred Gregory was saved and soon felt his call to the ministry and from this time on he took charge of the work and carried it on.

*/I want to leave for history a few notes, just as I recall them about my experiences and knowledge of the start and growth of the Bristow and surrounding community Church of God church. I moved to seven miles North West of Bristow in the winter of 1900, at that time there was no Church of God church building in this part of Oklahoma. The saints would meet in the homes of each other on Sunday and worship.] I was not saved at that time but was acquainted with the present movement and truth as we know it now. We had just moved from South East Missouri where my brother-in-law, Bro. Charley Scates was a Church of God preacher. He and Bro. A.B. Stansberry and some other of the older preachers would hold meetings in the "Old Sankey Hall" and other school houses in that community. This was as far back as about 1890.

It was about the year 1901 that we farm folk of the community about five miles Norhtwest of Bristow went togehter and built a one-room log school house, known as the Machlin School. I

was a member of its first school board and Tommy Henshaw of Bristow was the first teacher. Bro. Dave Machlin was the leading citizen of the community and a Church of God man. This Machlin school was used for our meetings and Sunday-School . Among the people that attended regularly were the families of Dave Machlin, Nate Butterfield, Charley Moore, Shadd Newell, Jim Winkleblacks, Dick Mayes and Ed Utz. / I was saved about this time in a meeting held by Bro. Forbes from Chandler, Okla. The first camp-meeting held in the Bristow community was about half a mile Southwest of the Dave Machlin home at a nice spring of water and at the edge of a grove of trees. The men of the community built a large brush arbor for the services, and one for the dinning hall, another for the cooks. The food was donated by we farmers and the cooking was done by the women of the farm homes. The food was free to all and was of the best. All kinds of fresh gruit, vegetables, freshly killbeef and lots of fried chickens and all that goes with it. Some of the leading preachers at this camp-meeting was the late Bro. Will Smith, Johnnie Harris, Ed Scriviner, J.D. Ferrill and Bro. Emory Shipman. The first Camp Meeting held in the town of Bristow was on the corner of West 9th. and Main St. now called Schrader corner. An old store building where the City Hall now stands was used for a cooking and dinning hall. The first meeting place for the first Bristow Church was the up-stair hall in an old tin building owned by Bob Brewer on the corner of N.W. Eighth and Main where the Safeway Store now stands. I was saved about 1903 and since that time God's work has had first place in my life. I was called and placed as a helper in the starting and building of the new Church and School buildings around Bristow. I and my family has had a part in the changes and growth of the Bristow Church from that time until the present. I was there when the church started in the farm homes, to the one-room school house, to the "44"

Community and then to Bristow. I have attended meetings when the work started at the "44" school house, Pinehill, Sunrise, Lovett, Ironpost, Hector Beaver, Henry Dunham, Depew, Shamrock, Spring Creek, Valentine, and many other farm districts around the town of Bristow.

I have attended most of the State Camp-meetings the Church has ever held in Oklahoma and every revival held near enough for me to attend, for the past fifty-five years. Inwas present and remember well when some of the ministers were saved such as: Bro. Dave Ladd, Bro. Henry Dunham, Bro. M.B. Boucher, Bro. Lewis Foster, Bro. Longfellow, and many others of along time ago. 7





FERRILL; A NUMBER OF FAMILIES ATTENDED THESE SER-VISES AFTER SHE MOVED TO BRISTOW FROM CUSHING. NAMING SOME OF FAMILIES ARE - MACHLANS, NEWELLS, YOUNGS, CRUZANS, UTZ, ED & POLLY SCRIVINERS, BURT AND MINNIE SCRIVINER, GREGORYS. BRO. EGAN CAME BEFORE SHE LEFT FOR CALIFORNIA. In 1914 Bro. and Sr. Snyder moved to the place adjoining "44" school house. Bro. Boucher with a number of others had been saved in a meeting held by Bro. Forbes. A Sunday School was organized and M.W. Snyder was elected Sunday School Supt. In those early days there was no regular pastor but the different brethren would preach and carry on the services. Bro. and Sr. Snyder were the parents of Sr. C.C. Mansfield and Br. & Sr. Mansfield came for a visit with them, and was asked to conduct a revival. This meeting was very fruitful, as I remember about 30 were saved and some of that number have become leaders of the work in Oklahoma. Many will remember the large baptizing on the Hector Beaver farm when the ice had to be broken on a cold wintry day.

Bro. Niswonger and family, Bro. Lou Bethel and family, Bro. Broucher and family, the Moores, Machlins, and others too numerous to mention, drove to each service in farm wagons and hacks, as there were no automobiles in the country at that time. Each year after that Bro. and Sr. Mansfield would return for a revival, and I believe he held ll in all. At that time ther was no congregation in Bristow so brush arbor and tent meetings were held. Some persecution was felt because of the truth in those days, and one time a man threatened Bro. Mansfield if his daughter came to the meeting and got saved. Seh did and many, many others, but the whipping never took place. The tent was usually filled and I remember one revival all who attended, who were not already saved, got saved except one man who came with Bro. Machlin and he was a Syrian and couldnt understand English. At this meeting Bro. D.F. Cooley came and helped in the latter part and did the day preaching. In those days we had day services.










I saw myself lost but Jesus came in and gave me that sweet peace. Then we went back to Kansas. My brother-in-law was a Methodist Minister. He baptised me and I was soon a menber of that church. The best I knew. I studied my Bible and the church there at Oxford, Kansas was real spiritual. We came back down here in 1920. We went to the Methodist church until our youngest son was healed. That was how I came in touch with the Church of God. I saw it, the church, and was teaching the one church. We went to the Sunday school at the Methodist then went to the Church of God for church. The first sermon I heard on Santification I went to the alter for the experience. I have lived and worked for the Lord every since. I have met with many a persecution but the Lord brought me through it all so I am still rejoicing in the Lord.


This is the story of my part in the Church work of the Church of God of Bristow, Oklahoma,

"I was saved on the night of August 10th, 1912 at 44 School House. Was baptized on August 13th, 1912. Was elected Sunday School Superintendent and served three years. In the year of 1915 the Church at Bristow and 44 decided to build a Church House in Bristow, We raised a cotton crop on my place and with the proceeds we bought two lots to build the Church House, In the Spring of 1916 we had raised enough money to buy the material, so we started to work, and with the help of all we soon had the Church built, free of debt, and only the pews to be bought. We Trustees went to the Bank and gave our note for the money, but in less than a year that debt was wiped out.

I have filled various places in the Church up to 1931. I was ordained a Minister of the Church of God on January 27th, 1918. My work mostly has been in the rural districts, but at present age has crept in on me until I cannot drive a car after night so I have to give up that work. In years past I was registered as a Part time Pastor Evangelist. My work has been successful for the Lord, I will not take space to speak of them. I have never lost the vision of the Church of God. I have always financed my own work with but very little outside help.

Dated at Bristow, Oklahoma, April 4th, 1949.

Brother and Sister Dunham were saved in 1912 at the Dunham School House. It wasn't long until Bro. Dunham started preaching in the Rural Districts and leading others to God. He is still faithful and often has the lesson for Prayer Meeting.

(In 1932 I was elected President of Missionary and served two terms. Then in 1940 was elected Sec.-treas. and Sr. Capps as pres. and I served 4 yrs. Later Gladys Sellers was pres. and when moved Emma Buford replaced her. In all, I was Sec.-Treas. for 8 yrs. These were pleasant years and I enjoyed doing my mission for Christ. These are some of the things our Group did and how we carried on our work. We made and sold doughnuts.

We went to work at 4 o'clock in the morning on special days, and had hot doughnuts in cafes for breakfast, as war came on, our supplies couldn't be bought so we had to quit making doughnuts. We did quilting, pieces and quilted quilts, some were sold others were given to the needy, also made aprons, tea-towels, pot lifters, pillow cases, lunch cloths, and many different pieces of clothing. Served dinners at sales, and some years had a stand at the County Fair. We served dinners in homes where death occured, helped needy families sometimes by giving them cash donations, other times food & clothing. We sent regularly to our State Treasurer, to Foreign Missions, We always gave to Christ Okla. Day. Also gave regularly to the church building fund, sent articles each year to Anderson, also gave articles to our State Camp Meeting. Always remembered our good pastor and his wife at Christmas time. My report for my last years term was cash taken in-\$766.90- with Sr. Lyman selling \$114.60 of this amt. We gave \$50.00 for Christ Okla. Day - Building fund \$110.05 -My health grew bad and I was not able to carry on my work as Sec .-Treas. so new officers were elected in 1948 - but I feel we have done a great work for our Lord. "The beginning of the Church of God movement was marked by its pioneer spirit which pushed men out into un-evangelized sections with the truth."

It was in such effort the first evangelists came into the vicinity of Bristow, Oklahoma in the year 1895 - 96. The first meeting was conducted in a log school house by the Rev. Grant Teeter and Rev. Emory Shipman. This meeting was about four miles north of Bristow. Other early ministers were Bros. G. W. Brake, W. H. Smith, C. S. Forbes, and others.

In 1910 a meeting was conducted by Bro. C. S. Forbes of Chandler, Oklahoma at the "44" school house four miles north east of Bristow where several were saved and a good work was started.

At this time, 1910, Bro. F. G. Gregory was preaching and holding Sunday School in his home at 5th. and Maple Street in Bristow. Later a hall was rented on Main Street where Bro. Forbes came once a month to preach. We held regular services.

In 1915 the Church, both in town and in the country, decided we needed a house of worship and it was decided to build in Bristow. A cotton crop was the project to raise money, both congregations ^{WOr}king together. Bro. D. M. Ladd donated the use of his land. Two lots were purchased on Walnut Street, between 3rd. and 4th. Streets and a church was soon completed, free of debt, with Bro. F. G. Gregory the first pastor. The following men were the board members: M.B. Boucher; W.R. Dunlap; C.H.Moore; Henry Boyd; and A.G.Hartwig. OUR FIRST CHURCH BUILDING - 1915 - BRISTOW, OKLAHOMA



The Story of Bro. J.D.Harmon

I was born on a farm at Erie, in McDonald County Missouri, in December 1877. Here amid the foothills of the Ozarks, with eight brothers and three sisters, I spent the early years of my life. I completed the public school offered to children of the rural districts of my school days.

My parents, John and Laura Harmon accepted the doctrine and obtained the experience of Holiness under the labors of Sr. C.A.Sunderland, and ever after that our home became the staying place of Holiness preachers. As a boy I remember most of them, some I wished would leave and never come back while others I wished would stay forever, and since God has called me to preach I have always tried to conduct myself in other peoples homes in such a way that I would be welcomed back. I have driven many miles in a two-horse wagon or hack, hauling Holiness preachers around over those Missouri hills but as I look back over it all now I enjoyed it all. After my parents were sanctified, our home was a very religious one. My mother was a very strict Sabbitarian until she cooked and served a whole sheep one Sunday, and I convinced her she worked harder on Sunday than any other day of the week. My parents believed the Bible was written to be obeyed and they were very strict with their childern, but I thank God for that.

In 1895 my father sold the remainder of his farm and moved his family to the Indian Territory, about half way between Chickasha and Pauls Valley on the Washita River.

I met and married a fine girl in 1903 and together we started in to build a home. We were working and striving hard to make things go, and they were going very well when one day I received a letter from my mother stating that they would come to our place en-route to attend the second camp meeting ever held in Oklahoma City, and they wanted

us to go with them. We talked it over and decided to go, but I had to make preparation for someone to care for my live-stock and I had to hurry and get my feed out and while I was gathering some corn for the hogs, the Lord begin to talk to my heart. It was heavy. It was full. I just leaned against the wagon wheel and cried like my heart would break. I did not know why I cried, I did not pray, but I became more anxious to get to that meeting. We finally arrived and about a dozen or two were also there. The first night the preacher ask if anyone wanted to make a prayer request and I arose and told them to pray for me. I do not remember what the preacher said during the meeting, but I do know that as soon as the alter call was made, I was the first one to the prayer bench and God gloriously saved my soul and also my wife was there praying thru. That was twentyeight years ago and as soon as I got home I went to making my wrongs right. The devil reasoned with me on the first one but I was determined and God so wonderfully blessed my soul that the devil was surely defeated in his plan for all the rest. I was anxious to get to every one I had wronged. The first morning we were home my wife and I set up our family alter, and it has been up ever since. We also started prayer meeting in our home and began to send for ministers to come and hold meetings for us. Soon there were quite a few saints scattered over the community. God began to lay it on my heart to preach to the folk of our community and at school houses around the country. I never had to leave home to find a place to preach. Finally I felt that God wanted mg for full time Preaching. I wanted to obey God, but I had several good milk cows and some good horses and thought perhaps it would pay for me to keep them and have some one just move onto my farm and work on shares, but God's book says that s soldier for God ought not to entangle with these things, so Good undertook to expedite things for me- and He did. My cows were in a pasture where an old dipping vat was left and one day while I was fixing their

watering place they got in this old vat and drank that arsnic water and all of them died in one day. God knew I could not do a good job preaching and looking after a farm too, so we were convinced that God wanted us to do his bidding so we sold everything we had, household goods and all and started out by faith in the evangelistic field. Most of our early preaching was in new places and rural districts. God always supplied our needs. One time we were wanted in a place but the people wrote that they were not able to pay our railroad fare. We replied that we were coming and would pay our own fare, we did and had a great meeting. One old man, whom we were told was an infidel, attended a part of the meeting and gave me \$25.00. We have reared two children and neither of them ever tasted medicine or was under a doctor's care until after they were married. We were pastor at Ripley two years, almost six years in Bristow, and later to Oklahoma City. When our children were ready for High School we prayed for God to give us a pastorate so we could be with our children during this time. God heard and answered our prayers. After our daughter was married, we went out into the evangelistic Okmulgee field again, later going to Reggs, where we built a new church house and a new parsonage. While there my health wasn't too good and God said "Move on." So we moved to Beggs where lived and worked. I also pastored the church in Ardmore for a while, after leaving Oklahoma City.

Brother Harmon departed this life August 22, 1949 at Bristow.

Willie (Bond) Harmon was born in Cooke County, Texas, near Gainsville. My parents moving to the Indian Territory in a covered wagon with 4 other families when I was only 6 years old. Well do I remember when we crossed Red River, the water was up to the wagon beds. Camping at nights was a delight to we children after traveling all day. Helping gather wood to make fires to cook our We were about a month making the trip, stopping at Alex, meals. Indian Territory for our first home, we lived in a half-log dug-out one night after raining very hard, my father rising early and stepped out of bed in water a foot deep, so that all had to be bailed out. before anything else could be done. Many and varied things happened in those Frontier Days. Walking to school two and three miles we would see wolves and prairie chickens across the hills. We moved to many different localities. My father was always interested in our education and going to Sunday School and church, helped to erect school houses here and there. Can recall many spelling matches on Friday afternoons when other schools would meet to see who had the best spellers. Those were the good old days of learning, reading, writing and arithmetic. My father was Sunday School Supt. and was giving a prize to the one who could repeat the most scriptures by memory in a certain period of time and the whole school , even my father, tried for this prize. I met my Captor winning over the whole school, even my father. It was one Sunday evening at milking time that my father called me to help with the chores, when J.D. Harmon said, "Now is my time." I will go talk with him, when he said Mr. Bond, your daughter and I have decided to get married and want your consent. So the date was set, December 23, 1903. When leaving his roof tree, said he had lost the best mule on the place. Many and varied were the happenings. We finally bought a farm and built a two room house and had the priveledge of living there ten

years, a son and daughter born to bless our lives. But the greatest blessing was when we went to Oklahoma City in a covered wagon driving three days to **a** camp meeting and sleeping in our wagon ten days and was born again at the first service at Wheeler Park and was baptized in the North Canadian River. That was the beginning of a new life, we started our family alter, and later our prayer meetings at our home and also our neighbors homes and Sunday School at our school house. Had ministers to come and hold meetings. Twelve or fifteen were soon saved and then Bro. Harmon begin to shepherd them. The results there was two ministers, one now a pastor in California with others of us that are still active in Gospel work, still glad to be busy every day learning better to serve my Master to try and live, share and be a blessing and example to every one is my daily prayer.






Besides being a pastor of this congregation, he is on many committees and boards of the State.




The Reverend James Holm will join the Church of God February 1 as the associate pastor and will arrive in time to help with the youth revival to be conducted through February 8 by the church.

BRISTOW

All church beginnings are from a strong desire of Christian people wanting to worship God with other Christians. So, this is the beginning of the First Church of God in Bristow, Oklahoma.

In 1895, Brother Grant Teter and Brother Emory Shipman conducted a revival meeting in a log school house about four miles northwest of Bristow. A number of people were converted and continued to worship in the homes. Occasionally, a preacher would come to preach on Saturday night and then the meeting would be held in the school house. Later, Brother G. W. Brake and Brother C. C. Forbes came to hold a revival in the "44" school house which was located about four miles northeast of town.

About this time, Brother F. G. Gregory was preaching in his home at Fifth and Maple Streets.

In 1915, it was decided to build a permanent place of worship. Two lots were purchased on Walnut Street between Third and Fourth Streets. With Brother C. G. Niswonger as carpenter, the building was soon completed debt free.

Brother F. G. Gregory was the first pastor and served until 1917 when Brother J. S. Glennon came. In 1919, Brother W. H. Smith came and served two years. Then

Brother M. B. Boucher came to be the fourth pastor and served until Brother J. D. Harmon came in January, 1924.

While Brother Harmon was here, balconies were added in the church for the enlarged congregation. Brother S. J. Lane held a revival here in 1930 and stayed on as pastor. He remained until 1934 when Brother J. F. Lawson came and pastored until Brother J. W. Pierce was called from Yale, Oklahoma.

Again the church needed to be enlarged, so the basement, as well as the auditorium was enlarged and dedicated in October, 1950. Each October, as long as Brother Pierce lived, we had "Homecoming" with many friends coming back to visit and relive the "good 'ole days." During this time, Brother and Sister Pierce were here, Doris Upchurch was called as our associate pastor and youth leader.

In 1953, Brother C. C. Funk was called and stayed until August, 1957. Brother Hatchel was called and served one year when Brother T. Watson Daniel came. During Brother Daniel's stay, David Williams was called to be the associate pastor. They served until 1964 when S. W. Nesmith was called and served a short time. Brother Arthur Hansen was called and stayed until 1967.

In July, 1967, Brother C. C. Funk was called again to be our pastor. During his stay we built a new \$125,000 church building just south of the old building.

In July, 1973, Brother D. C. Stafford was called to be our pastor. In 1975 Rod Stafford (son of D. C. Stafford) was called by the church to serve as youth minister. We have built a new three bedroom parsonage, debt free, and have now built a new Activities Building, which is also used each Sunday for our Children's Church and also for Children's Sunday School. In this building we also have a large room for the Women of the Church of God for their missionary work each week. We also have a large, well equipped kitchen and a beautiful library. This building is used every day of the week, but each time it is used it is well supervised and the activities are begun with a devotion.

In thinking over the past and who came from here as outstanding leaders, only God can be the judge of that. Of course we like to claim a few that come to mind. We think of Brother Charlie Stephens that has been our pastor and is now working in the church in Cushing, Oklahoma.






Florence and Claud White



DECISION

Therefore we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we should let them slip. For if the word spoken by angels was stedfast, and every transgression and disobedience received a just recompence of reward; How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation; which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed unto us by them that heard him; God also bearing them the witness, both with signs and wonders, and with divers miracles, and gifts of the Holy Ghost, according to his own will? Heb.2; 1-4

People are constantly making decisions. There has never been a time in the history of mankind when we have been confronted with so many things in which we must make a decision as the time in which we are now living. I wonder if we realize the importance of choosing the right course and the seriousness of the outcome. Some decisions are made in haste, without much consideration, others, perhaps have been delayed longer than necessary. Never-the-less the result of making decisions has often meant the difference between;---

Success or failure
 Health or sickness
 Peace or strife
 Wealth or poverty
 Honor or disgrace
 Victory or defeat
 Physical life or physical death
 Spiritual life or spiritual death
 Eternal life or eternal destruction

Whether we wish to or not, often times we come face to face with issues which involve such things as these. Then realizing this, how very careful we should be in making decisions. God has given us the privilege of making our own choices and decisions. It is an honor for us, as mere human beings, that God created us with a mind capable of deciding for ourselves.

There are three things we must consider when making decisions, which are of vital importance to us if we reap the good things in this list we have mentioned. These three things are;--

- 1. Making the right decision
- 2. The time we make our decision
- 3. The steadfastness of our decision

There are some decisions which are of greater importance than others. All these we have mentioned are important, yet some of them are much more important that others. For instance the one which has to do with our wealth instead of being poverty stricken. That is an important one and we should strive to provide a comfortable living for our families, but even more important than this, is the one where we would have <u>honor</u> instead of <u>disgrace</u>. Not so much honor among men, but honor with God. If we have honor with God, we won't have to worry about honor with men.

Then we might consider the one which deals with our physical life rather than physical death. In choosing a vocation, many people decide upon something dangerous, which brings death at an early age. Or perhaps in selecting companions, friends or associates, sometimes people make the wrong choices which lead them to sinful habits which destroy their body. We all value our lives highly and we feel that our life is our most valuable possession. It is well and good that we do value our lives and seek to protect and preserve them. But still, more important than this is our soul, -- Our Spiritual Life. The one great decision then, that we ever are priviledged to make, is the one to <u>Follow Christ</u>. To become His child.

The bible teaches us that we must seek <u>first</u> the Kingdom of God and <u>His</u> righteousness and all these things shall be added unto us. In other words, if we decide for Christ, He has promised to

help us in all our decisions, from that time forward. With our hand in His, He can lead us and guide us and we have nothing to fear. In the 14th. Chapter of John and the latter part of the 27th. verse, Christ said, "Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." That promise means a lot to me. In the days in which we are living, when so many issues are before us, it is very confusing. Sometimes we wonder what decision to make. But if we are walking hand and hand with God, then we have nothing to fear if we will but ask of Him and put our trust in Him. So many times we try to decide things ourselves and leave God out of it. That is where we make our mistake. God is interested not only in the big things we may be deciding, but the small things as well. We are partners with Him.

Next, is the Time in which we make our decisions. I might say that the opportune time to make a decision is the very moment we are convinced which one is right. In the professional world time is the determining factor as to whether one is a success or a failure. It takes years and years to accomplish the things which promotes a business or a profession of any kind. The students graduating from High School are now given so many days of lectures before school is out each year. These lectures are given by people who have been successful in their respective fields. They try to have as many vocations represented as are available, so as to help the young student graduating to select the field in which he is the most suited. Suppose one of these students selected something that he wished to become and then did nothing about it. He decided he would become a mechanic, yet he made no preparation to begin his career. You might ask him what his plans were and always he would say the same thing, but he kept putting off making any preparation .

Most anyone who has been taught there is a God, and there is a

Savior, have acknowledged that they should become a Christian, they have decided that is the right thing to do, yet, they put it off. They fail to make use of valuable time in which they can build a deep spiritual life.

I think of the rich young ruler. We are very familiar with this story of how he came to Jesus and ask Him what good thing he might do to inherit eternal life. Here was a man that seemingly had everything. He was young and that certainly was desirable. He was <u>rich</u>, and had everything in the temperal realm he could ever wish for. And he was a <u>ruler</u>, he had honor, popularity, and he had

authority. He was a good <u>moral</u> man. These are a lot of good and pleasant things to be true about any person, yet there was something about him that made him realize that he was unqualified for eternal life.anSolwhenlhe ask Jesus what he might do to inherit eternal life and He told him to sell all his possessions and give them to the poor and the bible says he turned away sorrowfully. No doubt, he thought he would study it over and make his decision later. But the very fact that he failed to decide to obey them, was proof that he decided against it. We have no record in the bible of him making any other decision.

Then there was Peter and Andrew who were fishing and Jesus walked by and saw them and bade them follow Him and that He would make them to become fishers of men. There was something about Him, even tho they knew Him not, that caused them to make their decision to obey.Him.

Then there is the story of the prodigal son who had squandered his inheritance in the wrong way and finally led to his degridation of feeding swine. Then when he came to his senses, saw himself as he was, realized there was a way out. He acted <u>then</u> and was gloriously restored to his father and home. When we decide what

is the right thing for us to do, then is the time to do something about it.

Then third is the steadfastness of our decision. This is so important that we remain steadfast regardless of what comes. The person who is always changing his mind doesn't get very far. He is unsettled, unstable, undependable and cannot be trusted. We should be unchangeable, unless, however we see we are wrong about something. It is quite possible to be conscientious and be wrong. When we see we are wrong then the thing to do is submit and go forward, still steadfast.

There was Judas, one of Christ's chosen desciples, one who with the others laid hands on the sick and prayed the prayer of faith and they were healed. Who was able through his faith in God to cast out devils and who followed and did the work of the other desciples. Yet, he made one wrong decision, he failed to remain steadfast, he yielded to temptation and became so despondent that he took his own life thus sealing his eternal destiny.

Then there was John Mark, whom we have all studied about. He also started out in the work of the Lord. Started with others on a missionary journey, but he let discouragement or something, hinder him and he turned back. It hurt the work of the Lord when he did this. It also hurts the work of the Lord when we fail Christ, when we fail to remain steadfast.

Much is said about Jod and his patience, and Job did exercise more patience than any other character whom we read about in the bible. But even Job's patience was prompted by a steadfast decision to follow Christ regardless of anything else. Job knew in whom he <u>had</u> believed, <u>did</u> believe and would <u>continue</u> to believe. Remember it was this steadfast hope and faith in God that brought him victory. It wasn't the sufferinge, the trials or the temptations, but it was his faithfulness through them that brought victory. That

is the way it is with us, as long as we live we will have crosses to carry, but as long as we are steadfast we can be victorious.

Remember when you were saved? You made the right decision, you came to Christ at the right time, and when you saw your need and His spirit called to you, and you yielded your life to Him, you began a new life. Of course you had trials to meet. Perhaps one of the first ones was the temptation to douvt your expierence. You had to be steadfast in this by reviewing again your obedience to the call of God when you went to the alter. You did all you knew to do, you met bible conditions and you loved God, loved His people, therefore you had no reason to doubt, but just remain steadfast.

Another temptation, no doubt you had to meet was discouragement. You became discouraged, and wasn't able to pray a beatiful prayer like some other christian you knew, or maybe because you couldn't testify as well as you thought you should. Remember when we became a christian, we entered into a school of learning and we cannot learn it all in a day, a week, or month, or even a year, but we are all in a school for God. We are gradually growing in grace and as we study God's word and apply ourselves, and pray much and attend worship services.

When God called Peter and Andrew to him, they were more ignorant concerning the gospel that any of us have been when Christ called us. When Christ called them He did not say "Come follow me and <u>be</u> fishers of men" He said "Come follow me and I will <u>make</u> you to <u>become</u> fishers of men". That is what we all are striving for each day to become more spiritual, to become more Christlike, and to become stronger and better christians. We are not to measure our lives by someone else's life, even tho they may be ever so spiritual--- we are to measure our lives to God's word. So may we be encouraged rather than to be discouraged. As long as we resist evil, study

God's word, pray much and are faithful to service, we can continue with a steadfast hope. We can say, as did Paul in Romans 8:38-39 For I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, now things present, now things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.



The youth program of the church is designed to encourage young people to attend church and become active in the church. This is the goal of the youth leaders. In the past year we have encouraged youth to take part in the special youth week program to take advantage of the Youth Fellowship hour on Sunday evenings, and also to take part in the social activities planned for them, such as skating parties, once a month socials, Sunday school class parties and so on.

The yearly Youth camp is also a high-light for the youth. Many (about 30) of the Bristow youth attended the Youth camp at Tahlequah, Oklahcma held in July.

It is not always an easy task to keep youth attending and active in the church. Those who have helped in this program in 1961 are: Youth Department Sunday School teachers, Madge Taylor, James Neighbors, Edith McAllister, Betty Sullivan and Sarah Belle Curry. Also Roy Pantry assisted as well as the Associate Pastor.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT OF THE CHURCH Reported by Wilma Taylor, Director of Music

The Music Department of the church is responsible for providing the special music for all of the services of the church as well as for revivals, church funerals and church weddings. Also the choir and its program come under the direction of the Music Dept.

The choir in the past year has had several projects. They presented an Easter Cantata for our church as well as presenting it for the Sapulpa Church of God and the Bristow Gospel Tabernacle. They presented a sacred concert of gospel music for the local church and one for the Fort Smith, Arkansas Church of God. The choir was responsible for the special music of the Christmas program as well as for the State Ministers meeting that was held in our church. Some of the choir members took part in the music program of the Community Thanksgiving program.

In the past year the choir purchased new choir robes with the choir members themselves paying one half of the cost and the other half to be raised by special projects. The total cost of the new robes was \$579.90.

We raised for special Missionary projects for the church a total of \$2,204.03. Some of this was used in our local community, some sent to special projects of the State, and some sent to the National Missionary Offices.

This money was raised by operating the fair stand, holding bazzars and rumage sales, selling donuts, bean dinners, cook books, and by quilting 19 quilts.

Some of the activities of the year were: preparing and serving 12 funeral dinners; sending cards of cheer to 67 persons; giving gifts at Christmas to 13 shut-in's; sending gift boxes to the Indian Missions at Christmas; sending over 200 articles to State Campmeeting for resale; gifts to members during their illness; bought one Memorial and one Life Membership, have helped pay on the new Choir robes; served 36 dinners to shut-in's; purchased a fan for the nursery; purchased extra dishes for the church kitchen and sponsored the building of new cabnets in the church kitchen.

The Women's Missionary Group of our church meets each Thursday for their devotion and work day.

MEN'S BROTHERHOOD Reported by Bill Daily

During the year of 1961 the Men met in the church basement on the second Tuesday of each month for a time of fellowship and sometimes feasting. They had several projects through out the year. Activities were varied in the different catagories of works; such as, buying doors, hanging doors, painting of doors, steps, and floors, replacing broken window glass, purchasing a new water fountain for the church and giving some assistance to needy persons. Also this year the Men sponsored the Pee Wee Baseball team which again was coached by Roscoe Pilant.

The meetings consisted of films, colored slides, and speakers, plus business meetings and food and fellowship. Our food ran all the way from snacks to real hones to goodness meals of 4, 5, & 6 courses.

The total income of the Men's Brotherhood in 1961 was \$348.38. The expenses for the projects mentioned above were \$321.24 leaving a balance on hand of \$27.14. The men who served the Men's Brotherhood as officers were Bill Daily, President, Dewayne Tallent, Vice President, and Roy Pantry, Secretary, Treasurer.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION Reported by James Neighbors, Chairman

The purpose of the Board of Christian Education is to study, plan, promote and improve Christian education in the local church. The following is a summary of the Boards actions in 1961.

- A. WORKERS CONFERENCES -- Teachers and workers conference was held each month during 1961 with an average of 86% of workers present at each meeting.
- B. VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL -- The Vacation Bible School was held May 31 to June 9, 1961 with David Williams as director. The average daily attendance was 79 children.
- C. SUNDAY SCHOOL GOALS-- Some of the goals to strive for during the year were: An average attendance of 258 and an enrollment of 332 by October 1962; maintain a constant visitation program; have every Sunday absentee follow-up; strive to win persons to Christ through the Sunday school; encourage Sunday school pupils to remain for church services; improve the over all Sunday school program; make our teaching more effective; and to deepen the understanding and appreciation of all for the Bible and to strive for greater spiritual growth for all.

Even though many of the goals of the Board were not achieved during 1961, we feel a great deal of progress was made in many areas.

- D. HOME CLASS -- A home Sunday school class was continued for shut-in's. Sister Harmon was supervisor and teacher.
- E. TRAINING COURSE -- The Board sponsored a study course for Sunday school workers in September. Brother Leroy Oesch, of Tulsa, led the course titled, "Spiritual Enrichment Nights".
- F. U.C.S.A. -- Our church entered into the second year of the United Church School Advance program. This is a national program for Sunday school advance.
- G. AVERAGE SUNDAY SCHCOL ATTENDANCE -- The average attendance for the past Sunday school year (October 1960 to October 1961) was 231.
- H. BYLAWS-A set of bylaws were adopted unaminously by the Board of Christian Education. These were approved by the teachers and workers of the Sunday school.
- I. BIBLES -- The Board authorized the purchase of Bibles to be given to the graduating Seniors of the High School.
- J. SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION --- The Board backed the attendance of our Sunday School teachers at the State Sunday School Convention in March, 1961.

GBC Honors Alumnus



The growth of the Waynoka Church has: made a building program necessary. The church is now in the early stages of this important effort.


